NICU & MSUD The Zimmerman Family

When Melissa Zimmerman heard a family member exclaim that her newborn baby girl smelled 'so sweet', she immediately knew something was amiss. Her newborn daughter, Kourtney, became fussier with each passing day and was refusing to eat. "After seeing how she was acting and hearing someone say that she smelled sweet, I had a gut feeling that she had Maple Syrup Urine Disease (MSUD)," explains Melissa. "We called the Clinic immediately and just two hours later, we were headed to Lancaster General Hospital."

Even though it was a weekend, the Zimmerman family was greeted at Penn Medicine Lancaster General Hospital by Dr. Vincent Carson (Pediatric Neurologist) and Donna Robinson (Nurse Practitioner) from the Clinic.

"The Clinic team met us in the parking lot of the hospital to make sure we didn't go through the emergency room with Kourtney. There they took a blood sample for urgent genetic testing to confirm she had MSUD. Donna even sampled Kourtney's earwax to see if it exhibited the classic sweet smell of a baby affected with MSUD, and it did." MSUD is a serious inherited metabolic disorder in which the body cannot process certain amino acids. If untreated, brain swelling can occur which can cause irreversible brain damage or death.

With her serious condition and the severity of her uncontrolled MSUD, the Clinic's doctors admitted Kourtney to Penn Medicine Lancaster General Health's Women and Babies Hospital (WBH). For the next 17 days, Kourtney was cared for around the clock at WBH's NICU (neonatal intensive care unit). "The NICU team at WBH was so great and helpful. They worked hand-in-hand with the Clinic's providers to educate us on her rare condition, and reassure us that everything would be okay," explains Melissa.

"Women and Babies Hospital has Lancaster County's first and most advanced NICU in our region. When we have to admit newborns facing serious and rare conditions, their team works collaboratively with us to ensure the child receives the specialized care they need. Other times, they will call the Clinic to help with a baby in need of specialized genetic testing. This partnership has elevated the care of many newborns. We are lucky to have them in our backyard here in Lancaster County," says Dr. Laura Poskitt, Medical Director at the Clinic.

"It was quite a journey during those early days with Kourtney. We had to watch her regain skills, like drinking from a bottle, that she lost while she was sick. We are grateful for the level of care WBH's NICU provided our family and how they worked with us. They are above and beyond," says the Zimmerman family. "With the care she received, I don't think she has any lasting damage and she continues to surprise us every day."

Today, Kourtney is just like any other 18-monthold. She's strong and tries to do everything that her siblings can do! She currently visits the Clinic every two months for checkups and will soon be put on the list to receive a liver transplant for her MSUD.

What do you wish people knew about the Clinic & our work?

Many people know about the medical care we provide for the community but are not aware of how our laboratory and research departments are intertwined with the care we give. Our

decades of cutting-edge research into rare diseases have allowed us to be a part of many medical breakthroughs locally and globally, making a difference in so many lives. Our innovative lab can obtain a genetic diagnosis on at-risk newborns faster than almost anywhere in the world, preventing death and disability in many children.

Collaborator Spotlight Katie A. Preedy, APRN-BC Nemours Children's Hospital, Delaware

The Nemours Children's Hospital in Wilmington, Delaware, offers a Level IV NICU, the highest level of neonatal care. The Clinic for Special Children has frequently collaborated with the Nemours NICU team to ensure infants facing serious rare genetic disorders get the best care possible. Katie Preedy, APRN-BC, the manager of the Neonatal Advanced Practice Provider (APP) team at Nemours, is a close collaborator of the Clinic and has provided compassionate care to many Clinic families.

Raised in Dresher, PA, Katie has spent most of her career working as a Neonatal Nurse Practitioner (NNP) at Nemours. She attended West Chester University, studied nursing, and earned her degree. She later moved to California and worked as a travel nurse, where she would later meet her husband, Ian. For a year, they took a hiatus from working to backpack and camp throughout New Zealand, Australia, and Southeast Asia. After returning home, she went to school to earn her master's degree as an NNP at the University of Pennsylvania.

"I learned about the Clinic more than a decade ago while caring for a baby with CODAS syndrome in our NICU. I was unfamiliar with this rare condition and learned about the capabilities and scope of the state-of-theart on-site laboratory at the Clinic, which allows the clinicians to quickly diagnose genetic disorders that might otherwise take weeks or months at other centers," explains Katie. "Over the years, the expertise and communication from the Clinic staff has helped our NICU team understand more about some of the genetic conditions affecting the unique population we care for. We've also cared for Clinic families in our Advanced Delivery Unit (ADU), which allows expectant mothers carrying infants with prenatally diagnosed congenital anomalies to deliver at Nemours, where the babies can be closely monitored before they are born and immediately after birth to optimize their outcomes."

In addition, Katie has collaborated with the Clinic team and other Nemours physicians on research and co-authored a publication to evaluate clinical outcomes of patients with Ellis-van Creveld syndrome (EVC). "I have a clinical interest in caring for babies with skeletal dysplasia and other rare conditions," she shares. "Through this research and the collaboration of the Clinic and the NICU team at Nemours, it's helped us implement some condition-specific practices in the NICU, which we feel has improved the care they receive and shortened the hospital length of stay for many patients from the Plain Community." Katie has presented at several educational and family days hosted by the Clinic and serves as a liaison between the Clinic and Nemours to make the discharge process to home a smooth transition.

"Serving as a liaison between the Clinic and Nemours has allowed me to get to know many Clinic families. It has been a privilege to visit some families in their homes, farms, and even at their children's schools. Seeing families in their environment helped me better understand their lifestyle and practices so we can support them with everything they need to be safely discharged home," shares Katie.

"Katie has been a long-time advocate for Plain families at Nemours. It is common for Katie to call us with a baby just born to a Plain family," shares Dr. Laura Poskitt, the Clinic's Medical Director. "We often work together to find a genetic diagnosis quickly, inform the family, work with the NICU team to customize the care plan and collaborate to ensure the baby comes home as soon as possible. Since Katie has ensured the Clinic has been involved all along, we can provide the most seamless care transition from hospital to home."

When asked about the proudest accomplishment of her career, Katie says, "the privilege of working with a team of exceptional medical professionals and an entire discharge team who have a common goal of delivering the safest and best care possible to infants and children while also supporting each other. From making sure these vulnerable infants have the best possible start in life to sending them home with parents who are prepared to care for them safely has been my professional mission."

Katie and her husband share three sons: Evan, Luke, and Jack. She enjoys camping, hiking, pickleball, and anything outdoors. We're grateful to Katie and the Nemours team for their dedication to providing the highest level of care to babies in need.


